## The Bug Hotel

It's great to build a hotel that doesn't need architects plans or planning permission, so we have built one in our school grounds to encourage more bugs and wildlife to visit. Our bug hotel is made entirely from recycled materials, the main structure are wooden pallets and the other materials we have found around our school grounds. The hotel has dead wood for beetles and crevices for centipedes and woodlice, holes for solitary bees, stick and leaves for ladybirds, and upturned flower pots for bumblebees. Our hotel is near to the school boundary with the South Downs National Park so we can encourage bugs from there to visit us and check in at the Bug Hotel.
